WRECK OF THE WORLD'S UGLIEST WARSHIP MAY LIE IN MORRIS COVE

New Haven: Professor Carl Ferrite of the Yale Department of Magnatology thinks that NHMA1 (New Haven Magnetic Analomy 1), a large mass of ferrous metal detected by one of his instruments, might be the remains of a French battleship from the 1890s. The exact location of the sunken mass of metal is being kept secret.

While professor Ferrite refused to comment, a graduate student in his blurted out "We think it's the Charles Martel." If so, the discovery would solve one of the sea's enduring mysteries: what happened to the pride of the Mediterranian Escadrille? Finished in 1897, the warship was 378 feet long and displaced almost 13,000 tons. Charles Martel had two heavy masts with a tall flying deck between them. Her forecastle gave her a high freeboard forward, but her quarterdeck was cut down to the main deck level aft. Her hull was given a marked tumblehome to give the 27 cm guns wide fields of fire while the ram bow made it seem as if the prow were missing. Asked to comment after the warship's initial sea trials, Louis-Émile Bertin, the Director of Naval Construction, responded with a single word: "chavirable." (prone to capsizing).

The ship is said to have disappeared while on a goodwill mission in June of 1914, shortly before the outbreak of the First World War. Your newsletter is attempting to find out if the goodwill mission might could been to a North American port. If so, why not New Haven?





MINUTES OF THE VIRTUAL MEETING OF THE NEW HAVEN YACHT CLUB BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEETING 5 May 2021



TREASURER'S REPORT FOR BOARD OF GOVERNORS, May 5, 2021



As for membership, we have 56 members including 44 Full, 5 Associate and 7 honorary. Last year, we had 53 total members. We have 5 new full members, 1 former member returned and two resignations. There is the potential for 2 new members shortly.

Need to Discuss

- -All monthly and quarterly state taxes have been paid.
- -Remaining costs for piling installation
- -We had 13 members on Sunday installing docks who mostly already completed Spring work parties, do we want to give $\frac{1}{2}$ day credit for efforts? Board decided no on this issue.

Potential member with San Juan 23 on trailer would like to bring boat to yard. What is earliest date possible?

Committee Reports:

<u>Launch</u>: There are 6 launch attendants hired, 4 are returning and 2 are substitutes. Joe investigated state guidelines for launch service. Our proposal of having 4 passengers and 1 attendant with masks meets the requirements for the state guidelines now. Joe shared season guidelines for operation. Signage will be posted at the dock stating masks required from this point on. Guidelines are subject to change as the state directs.

Barry suggested that we consider running a second launch on a staggered schedule on the weekends to avoid backups and wait times for ferry. Carlo suggested that we could have a courtesy launch that is run by a member. Members would have to be dedicated in advance. Logistics of tides for launches in/out was discussed. Review of

current policy from an operational standpoint will need to be on-going as season begins and declares itself.

<u>Moorings</u>: The pennant line on mooring 404 has nearly chaffed through and needs to be replaced. Raimund is going with this task to replace the pennant line. There are 3 fouled moorings that need to be addressed: 203,208,211.

<u>Yards and Docks</u>: docks are all installed. The metal pilings are all installed. Positioning on some may need adjustment.

<u>Website</u>: is up and running. Paul will post the launch schedule and operation guidelines on the website. Robert suggested that we consider publishing a website version of the minutes. A scrubbed version could go onto the website. 100% of new membership is coming from the website. Perspective new members might be curious to see how the board meetings are run.

Cruise: schedule pending.

House and Grounds: no report.

Race: schedule pending.

<u>Social</u>: *Sailabrations* will commence after July 4th. Volunteers are needed to host the *sailabrations*. The club reimburses up to \$100.00 for cost of snacks and drinks. Memorial Day is fast approaching. Masks are not required for outdoor gatherings. Masks will be required in the clubhouse.

<u>Membership</u>: there are 56 members including 44 Full, 5 Associate and 7 honorary. Last year, we had 53 total members. We have 5 new full members, 1 former member returned and two resignations. There is the potential for 2 new members shortly.

Old Business: . Mike and Paul plan to address this issue.

<u>New Business</u>: The bank is offering a credit card to the club and Frank would like to pursue this for his use as Treasurer for club business. A motion was made and unanimously passed to allow Frank to apply for a credit card for club business.

Raimund inquired about the possibility of on-line banking for payment of dues and fees. Frank is going to make some inquiries and report in June. Pay pal option was discussed. Frank will investigate this option. Members could choose to setup automated clearing house payments for dues and fees directly into the club account from individual bank accounts.

Frontier is going to install a new fiber optic box on the other side of the hedges. SCG is going to be installing new gas lines in front of the club house and the gas lines under the house. Cable for security cameras may conflict with installation of the gas line. Cable will need to be clearly marked with paint and include depth of the cable to avoid breech. Water lines may also be in question. Frank will spray cable location with paint and alert the SCG company of its presence.

Nick has suggested that the club consider a proposal to fend the planks at the seawall with rubber facing to better protect the boats during hauling. Cost of the project would be approximately \$5,000. It is a 2-day project that will require dedicated participants that will be given work party credit. There is general agreement that the project should take place. The details will be finalized at the next meeting.

Manning suggested that the club purchase US sailing association rule books. They are cheaper in bulk of 25 at the cost of \$80.00. It was determined that club purchase is not necessary and that members should undertake this as a personal expense.

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Adjournment:

A motion was made and unanimously passed to adjourn the meeting at 8:18.



Neve Campbell suddenly slacks the mainsheet



What to Do if Your Anchor is Snagged on a Sunken French Battleship

Snap an anchor-retrieval ring and buoy around the anchor line. A large fender can be used in place of a buoy. Start your auxiliary and drive past the sunken French battleship at about 45 degrees. The float and ring, which serve as a pulley, will move down the rode. The ball's buoyancy combined with the boat's pull can free a stubborn anchor if it's not hooked on a barbette or railing. Keep driving until you see the anchor ball break the surface astern. At this point, it can easily be pulled in. Note that if the anchor is snagged on a 305mm gun, even this technique might not free it. Always use caution when motoring while tethered to a sunken warship of any sort.
